Role of the Returning Officer (Elections Calgary)

The Returning Officer role and responsibilities are legislated in the Local Authorities Election Act (Sec. 14)

- Administer election
- Give notice of election
- Accept candidate nomination papers, and disclosure statements
- Recruit and train election workers
- Establish voting stations
- Provide for advance voting opportunities

Note: The Returning Officer does not have a role in candidate or campaign conduct or enforcement.

- Results reporting
- Conduct recounts when required
- Maintain register and disclosure statements for local political parties, slates and third-party advertisers
- Refer complaints, allegations and information to Election Commissioner
- Share campaign disclosure statement noncompliance with Council and school boards



Returning Officer – Independent and Impartial

- 13.1 (1) A returning officer must be independent and impartial when performing the duties of a returning officer.
 - (2) No local jurisdiction, its officers or any other person shall obstruct or attempt to influence the returning officer in the carrying out of the duties of a returning officer.

Local Authorities Election Act (LAEA) Sec. 13.1



Candidate administrative responsibilities

Are you eligible to vote?

To vote in the General Election, you must, on the day you choose to vote:

- · Are at least 18 years old.
- Are a Canadian citizen.
- · Are a resident of Alberta, and
- in the city of Calgary to vote for mayor,
- in the ward to vote for councillor,
- in the Calgary Board of Education jurisdiction ward for public school trustee voters,
- in the Calgary Roman Catholic Separate School Division jurisdiction ward for separate school trustee voters. A separate school trustee voter must also declare that they are of the same faith as the Calgary Roman Catholic Separate School Division (Roman Catholic),
- · Provide one of the authorized pieces of identification (this card cannot be used for identification).


For mail-in ballots to be counted, they must be received by Elections Calgary **before 12 p.m. (noon) on Oct. 20, Election Day**.

Vote Voting Station Locations Voting Station Locations




- Stations are selected independently by Elections Calgary through a data-driven process.
- The number of voters served by a voting station are kept small.
 - Easier to manage the hand count
 - Ensure voting stations are conveniently located
- Each voting station is inspected against established criteria to ensure they meet:
 - Physical accessibility
 - Functional requirements
- Temporary measures such as ramps and bevels are used when necessary to provide a safe voting experience.










A voter who wants to cast their ballot during the **Advance Vote** period can also find the Advance Vote stations closest to them.



Permanent Electors Register (PER)

- Municipalities in Alberta are now required by provincial legislation to prepare and maintain a PER of residents who are eligible to vote. Together with acceptable identification, the PER will be used by election officials to verify the eligibility of individuals to vote in the October 20, 2025 General Election.
- The PER must be compiled and revised by Elections Calgary primarily using information received from Elections Alberta.
- **897,811** electors (as of Sept. 16, 2025).
 - Adjusted number 896,042. Removes addresses that no longer exist.
- Candidates will not receive a copy of the PER
 - The LAEA directs that candidates, official agents or scrutineers will not take photographs or make copies of the PER.

Key Messages

- You can still vote, even if you are not registered. Visit your voting station with your ID to vote.
- Encourage voters to understand the registration and ID requirements.
- Look for the voter guide and voter card in September.



How the PER is Used in a Voting Station

Advance Vote

Electronic Live Strike-Off

- Election workers use laptops and strike-off voters electronically from the PER at the voting station.
- The PER updates in real time.
- Voters will appear as already voted if they go to another voting station or if they voted by mail-in ballot.
- The electronic PER lists all registered voters in the City of Calgary.

Why this matters

- Advance Vote is a vote anywhere model
- Live strike-off limits voters' ability to vote multiple times at different voting stations.

Election Day

Manual Strike-Off

- Election workers have paper copies of the PER and strike-off voters manually.
- The paper copies are updated from Advance Vote to indicate voters who voted during Advance Vote or who have voted by mail-in ballot.
- The paper copies only list voters who are assigned to vote at that voting station.


Why this matters

- On Election Day, voters must vote at their assigned voting station.
- Voters who try to vote at another voting station must have ID showing that they live in the area assigned to that station.





 - reside in Alberta, and
 - in the city of Calgary, to vote for mayor,
 - in the ward, to vote for councillor,
 - in the Calgary Board of Education jurisdiction ward for public school trustee; or
 - in the Calgary Roman Catholic Separate School Division jurisdiction ward for separate school trustee. A separate school trustee voter must also declare that they are of the same faith as the Calgary Roman Catholic Separate School Division
 - show one piece of authorized ID





Identification Requirements

Option 1

Voter is on the Permanent Electors Register (PER)

 One piece of ID issued by a Canadian government, whether federal, provincial or local, or an agency of that government, that contains a photograph of the person. For example, a driver's licence, an Alberta ID card or a Canadian passport.

NOTE: Form 13 is used for every voter to track the ballots they received. Only voters who align with Option 2 are required to sign the form. The election worker completes the section related to ballot selection.

Option 2

Voter is not on the PER

Voter is on the PER but does not have governmentissued photo ID

Voter wants a school board ballot

- Complete Form 13 (Elector Register).
 - One piece of identification issued by a Canadian government, whether federal, provincial or local, or an agency of that government, that contains a photograph of the person, the person's name and the address of the person's residence.
 - One piece of identification that contains the person's name and current address (next slide).
 - One piece of identification that contains the person's name and an eligible voter to vouch, who meets the requirements and completes Form 14 Statement of Voucher.





Government-issued documents

- Alberta driver's licence or ID card.
- Fishing, trapping, or hunting licence.
- Government cheque or cheque stub.
- Income/property tax assessment notice.
- Letter from a public curator, public quardian or public trustee.
- Statement of government benefits (e.g. employment insurance, old-age security, social assistance, disability support or child tax benefits).



Other Documents

- Bank/credit card statement or personal cheque.
- Insurance policy or coverage card.
- Pension Plan statement of benefits, contributions or participation.
- Residential lease or mortgage statement.
- Utility bill (e.g. telephone, public utilities commission, television, hydro (electric), gas or water).
- Vehicle ownership, registration or insurance certificate.
- Correspondence issued by a school, college or university.



Attestation Forms

Attestation forms are authorized to be used as a form of identification in the following circumstances.

- A voter who resides in a supportive living or longterm care facility.
- A voter who resides in student housing on a campus.
- A voter who is an inmate.
- A voter who receives services from a shelter or community support centre.
- A voter who is renting their ordinary residence.



Vouching

If a voter does not have acceptable ID with their current address, they may have another voter vouch for them.

The voucher must:

- be eligible to vote,
- have acceptable ID,
- be listed on the (PER), and
- at the voting station, complete Form 14 Statement of Voucher.

Form 14 Statement of Voucher sets out that the voucher:

- knows the person,
- knows the person resides at the address indicated on the statement, and
- has not been vouched for themselves.

A voucher may only vouch for more than one person, if the people they are vouching for live in the same residence (one household maximum).

Scrutineers are prohibited from vouching.



Elector Register Form 13

Voters must complete **Form 13**:

- To confirm eligibility to receive a school board ballot (either Calgary Board of Education or Calgary Roman Catholic Separate School Division).
- If they are **not on the permanent electors register**.
- If they are on the permanent electors register, but they do not have Canadian government-issued photo ID.

Form 13 is sealed in the ballot box when the voting station closes.

A duplicate copy is returned to the Elections Calgary office to be forwarded to Elections Alberta.

Who can be a scrutineer


- Scrutineers must be at least 18 years old and must not have been convicted of an offense in the previous 10 years under the following acts:
 - Local Authorities Election Act
 - Election Act
 - Election Finances and Contribution Disclosure Act
 - Canada Elections Act
- Candidates have the discretion to appoint scrutineers using the legislated scrutineer forms.

Role of the Scrutineer

- Observe the voting process at voting stations.
- Observe ballot counting process at voting stations and the counting centre.

Scrutineer Conduct in a Voting station

- Scrutineers must abide by rules at voting stations and the counting centre.
- A Presiding Deputy Returning Officer (PDRO) can ask scrutineers to leave the voting station if they are creating a disturbance or not following the rules.

Advance Vote stations

• Voting process (entry at 9:45 a.m. permitted). Stations open at 10 a.m.



Election Day stations

- Voting process (entry at 9:45 a.m. permitted). Stations open at 10 a.m.
- Count of ballots (entry by 8 p.m. permitted). Stations close at 8 p.m.



Counting centre

- Starting on Election Day, count starts at 7:30 p.m.
- Count of Advance Vote, mail-in ballots, hospitals, care facilities and shelters.
- Max. of 3 scrutineers per candidate.



What scrutineers cannot do



- Prevent an elector from voting.
- Object to a person voting.
- Assist an elector to mark a ballot (an election worker can assist an elector and is sworn to secrecy).
- X View an elector marking their ballot.
- Campaign inside or outside the voting station, including the parking lot.
- Wear campaign materials such as buttons, t-shirts or hats.

- \times Talk to an elector in the voting station.
- Touch or request to see voting materials, including the electors register
- Vouch for a person at the voting station.
- X Count ballots.
- X Take phone calls inside the voting station.
- X Take a photo or make a copy of the permanent electors register.




Counting Centre Floor Plan

Unofficial Results

Unofficial election results will be made available on electionscalgary.ca, as reported from voting stations and the Counting Centre on Election Day, and additional days, as required.

Official Results

- Required to be finalized by 12 p.m. (noon) on October 24.
- Media release afternoon of October 24.
- Results by voting station released to candidates the afternoon of October 24.





There are three types of recounts:

- 1. Preliminary
- 2. Official Results Recount on request
- 3. Judicial

- **Inaccurate result**. Candidate, official agent or scrutineer shows grounds that the Returning Officer (RO) considers reasonable for alleging that the record of the result is inaccurate.
- Objected and rejected ballots. Number of valid ballots objected to or rejected ballots was sufficient to affect the result of the election if they had not been counted or rejected.
- Administrative or technical error. RO is of the opinion there may have been an administrative or technical error in the count of votes.
- **Deadline**. Application for a recount within 44 hours of the close of voting stations (Wednesday, Oct. 22, 2025, at 4 p.m.)

Recount on request (Close vote)

New for 2025

- Within 0.5% Official Results. The difference between the first and second highest number of valid votes is within 0.5% of the total number of valid ballots marked at the election for that office at a voting station.
- Request by candidate. The application for a recount may only be made by the candidate with the second highest number of votes or the official agent of that candidate.
- **Deadline**. The application for a recount on request must be made within 72 hours after the statement of results (official results) is announced or posted (Monday, Oct. 27, 2025, at 12 p.m.)

Voting station recount; not city-wide.

At any time within the 19 days after the close of the voting stations on By-election Day, any elector may apply to the Court for a recount, after the elector has:

- Filed an affidavit with the clerk of the Court alleging reasonable grounds for believing that the returning officer or a deputy or other officer presiding at the voting station, in counting the ballots given at the election, improperly counted or rejected ballots, and
- Deposited with the clerk of the Court \$300 in cash, or by certified cheque or by money order, as security for the payment of costs and expenses.

At least 3 days prior to the application for a recount to the Court, a copy of the application and the affidavit filed shall be served by the applicant on the secretary, the returning officer and all candidates for the affected contest.





Campaign contributions to candidates

Who can contribute	Contributions limits
Alberta residents	 Per calendar year: \$5,000 in the aggregate to all council candidates (includes mayor and councillor). \$5,000 in the aggregate to all public school board candidates. \$5,000 in the aggregate to all separate school board candidates.
Alberta trade unions and employee organizations, corporations that do business in Alberta	 Per campaign period (2024 and 2025 combined): \$5,000 in the aggregate to all council candidates (includes mayor and councillor). \$5,000 in the aggregate to all public school board candidates. \$5,000 in the aggregate to all separate school board candidates.
Self-contribution	 A candidate can self-contribute \$10,000 per campaign period (2024 and 2025 combined) to their own campaign.

- All candidates must submit a campaign disclosure statement to Elections Calgary. This includes any candidate who:
 - withdraws their nomination,
 - self-funds their campaign,
 - runs a campaign with zero expenses or contributions, or both, or
 - files a notice of intent to be nominated in 2024 or 2025.
- Candidates are responsible for ensuring that their disclosure statements are accurate and submitted on time. Candidates are responsible for City of Calgary late filing fees or Election Commissioner of Alberta administrative penalties, if applicable.

NEW* September 30, 2025

- The Local Authorities Election Act (LAEA) was updated to require candidates for the 2025 General Election to submit financial disclosure statements by Sept. 30, 2025, if they received contributions between Jan. 1, 2025 and July 31, 2025.
- Candidates **must** submit original documents with original signatures. The documents must be submitted in person at the Elections Calgary office or by mail. Digital submissions sent by email will **not** be accepted.

Download and complete Form 26.

Complete Form 26

Form 26 includes:

- Total amount of individual, union, or corporate contributions of \$50.00 or less.
- Total amount of individual, union, or corporate contributions of \$50.01 and greater. Total amount of the candidate's own funds, which has not been reimbursed from the campaign funds.
- Total net amount from fund-raising functions. For details on what is eligible from fund-raising functions, see LAEA section 147.31.

Step 2

Provide additional documents about contributions and expenses, if applicable.

Additional documents:

- · Contributions list
- Itemized expenses
- Itemized list of any transfers made between an endorsed candidate and a registered local political party
- Amendments to disclosure statement (if required)
- Review engagement report (if required)

Submit disclosure statement

Step 3

Submit the disclosure statement to Elections Calgary before the deadline.

How to submit:

- 1. In person: Appointment required call Elections Calgary at 403-476-4110 or email <u>candidates@calgary.ca</u>.
- Mail or courier: Submit by mail or courier. Please consider mailing time; Elections Calgary must receive the disclosure statement by the deadline. Mailing dates or postmarks do qualify as meeting legislative deadlines.

Disclosure statements submitted by **email** will **not** be accepted.
